### NOTICES

✓ **Coming Soon: LDS Family History Center in Mahwah, NJ**—According to an article in the Fall 1990 *Genealogical Society of New Jersey Newsletter*, an additional Family History Center will open in Mahwah, N.J. by the end of 1990. Since Mahwah borders on Rockland County, this center would be convenient to residents in both Rockland County NY and Bergen County, NJ.

✓ **A New Westchester County Journal**, *Westchester Connections* was recently established by the Westchester Genealogical Society. It includes articles and material of genealogical interest pertaining to Westchester County. The journal is 8-1/2" x 11", 64pp, comb-bound. The first issue is available for \$6.00 (plus \$1.50 postage) from The Westchester County Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 518, White Plains, NY 10603.

✓ **To preserve Rockland County records**, Rockland County Archivist Peter J. Scheibner writes in the October 1990 Archival Newsletter, *It's About Time*, that working under the direction of the Office of the County Executive, about half of the county records have been inventoried. Some of these records, such as the proceedings of the county board of supervisors from 1798 to 1841 will be placed in an underground, climate-controlled building located inside a limestone cave in the Ulster County community of Rosendale. This unique facility, 60 feet underground, is known as Iron Mountain. Negotiations are in progress with Spring Valley facility for the storage of original tax books from the years 1860-1920; also for storage of Board of Elections and Health Department records. Working with Judge Alfred J. Weiner, the County Archivist is planning the storage of wills dating from 1798-1900. These court records are to be preserved on micro-film.

✓ **Albany Bureau of Vital Records Closed**—Notices in recent Ulster County and Westchester County Genealogical Society Newsletters report that members who attempted to use the Vital Records Room of the NYS Department of Health in the Tower Building in Albany found that it had been closed in September. They were told that the records

were to be moved and that because of budget cuts the records would be available only by mail order (with responses taking from 3-4 months). The Capital District Genealogical Society (CDGS) has suggested to the Vital Records Section that microfiche copies of the vital records be deposited for public use with the New York State Library in Albany and at other libraries in several major cities throughout the state. The CDGS has offered to pay for copies.

LDS Branch Library.** FamilySearch is at Salt Lake City and at present Scarsdale is the only LDS Family History Library in New York state to offer it. The system searches for information on CD discs using computers equipped with CD players and the appropriate software. Scarsdale also has Personal Ancestral File (PAF) software on its computer for the use of its patrons as well as the complete Family History Library Catalog on microfiche, the latest edition of the International Genealogical Index (IGI), microfiche and microfilm readers, and a microfiche/microfilm printer. The Scarsdale Family History Library, recently opened at 60 Wayside Lane, is Westchester County's second LDS branch library—the first is in Yorktown and includes the Westchester County Genealogical Society library. ## How to Hire a Professional Genealogist

*Program by Laura LeBarron presented at the June 26, 1990 meeting of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County. Notes by Joan Brooks, GSRC Recording Secretary.*

Laura LeBarron is Senior Vice President and Newsletter Editor of the Westchester County Genealogical Society.

Before hiring a professional researcher you need to define the problem. Do you need a birthdate, a will, or land record? Do you need to find out what county in a particular state an ancestor came from? What is it you want the researcher to do? Be very specific. Review what has already been done by you or others; make a note of the sources used, and what the results of the searches were. Consult books such as The Source for ideas as to types of records that may solve the problem. Look at guides to specific geographical areas such as New York Genealogical Research or The Library to see what kinds of records are available in that location. In addition, many Archives and Libraries have brochures and guides to

the specific collections in their possession. Consulting these sources can give you fresh ideas as to how to tackle the problem yourself.

Finally, you have to determine whether you need to hire a genealogist or a record searcher. The record searcher mainly searches the records you specify, while a genealogist analyzes the problem and decides what should be done. Also, you should consider whether you need someone who has expertise in some particular area, such as ability to read a foreign language, searching adoptions, etc.

In order to find a researcher, ask others in your Society if they have had any experiences with them. You can also look at specialized periodicals such as *The Genealogical Helper* or *Heritage Quest* which carry ads from researchers. In addition, once a year *The Genealogical Helper* publishes a "Directory of Professional Genealogical Researchers."

The Board for Certification of Genealogists in Washington, D.C. certifies researchers in several categories, including Certified Genealogist (CG) and Certified Genealogical Record Searcher (CGRS). The Family History Library in Salt Lake City has an accreditation program which accredits genealogists (AG) in various areas including foreign countries. Each of these groups will provide a list of researchers who are screened by them, but will not accept responsibility for work done by them.

The Association of Professional Genealogists (APG) will provide a list of their members and the International Genealogy Consumers Organization will provide a list of their "Registered Genealogists." You can also contact a local library, genealogical, or historical society. Many of these have lists of professional researchers, although they will not accept responsibility for the work of these individuals.

Once you have a list of possibilities, write to several, with a brief outline of your problem and what you want done. Be sure to ask for the researcher's credentials; for example, qualifications, experiences, whether they are part or full time, rates, and the timetable for accomplishing the work. Rates may be charged by the hour or by the job. You may be charged separately for a travel time, copies, etc. There are many fine researchers who do not have the accreditations, but you have to be careful.

Once you have hired the researcher, be sure to provide the person with all pertinent data already collected, so that the work is not duplicated. Some researchers use a formal contract; others are more informal. In any event, be sure you spell out exactly what you expect of the researcher, so there are no questions later. The information you receive back should be well-documented.

In some cases you may encounter a researcher who does not do the job. Most problems are caused by poor communication between the parties involved. If this does happen, contact the researcher and explain the problem. Give the person a chance to respond and make an explanation. If this does not clear up



the situation, contact the organization from which you received the person's name. In most cases, even though they are not responsible, they will try to resolve the issue. If this is not successful, as a final resort you can contact the International Genealogy Consumer Organization (IGCO) and they will try to mediate between the researcher and the client. If the researcher does not reply, a warning will be issued in their semi-annual Consumer Report. (Be aware that clients who do not pay their bills will also be listed here.)

## 1855 NEW YORK STATE CENSUS, ROCKLAND COUNTY

Transcribed by Pat Wardell

This 1855 census, although incomplete, is especially valuable because at this early date it gives relationships to the head of the family of all individuals living in a household (the Federal Census notes relationships beginning in 1880). Only the Towns of Haverstraw and Ramapo are represented by the extant pages of the 1855 Census. Of these, the First ED (Election District) of Haverstraw is missing and the first ED of Ramapo is mostly missing.

Spellings have been retained exactly as written, as far as can be determined.

Doubtful readings of names and occupations are enclosed in square brackets, i. e. [ ] and guesses are enclosed in square brackets with a question mark, i. e. [Smith?]; "wild" guesses will have two or more question marks. Interpolations by this transcriber are enclosed in parentheses, i.e. (obscured) or (illegible). In some places ink spills or other damage has completely obscured portions of the handwritten enumeration; in other places, the notation is illegible either because of poor handwriting, entries that have been written over, damage to the record, or poor microfilming. Numbers and/or letters which are out of sequence, unusual or unlikely are underlined by this transcriber to draw the reader's attention and to indicate that the entry, though unusual or possibly in error, is as given in the original and is not a transcriber's typographical error.

Page numbers of the original census are indicated in parentheses on a separate line in the "dwelling" column when a page break occurs. The day on which that page's data was collected is indicated on the same line in parentheses in the "Name" field.

The tight binding of pages of the census has hidden some of the "dwelling" numbers which appear in the extreme left column and some of the Comments in category 21 in the extreme right column; when a number or comment was not visible, an asterisk was inserted to so indicate.

Occasional comments by the enumerator are either inserted in quotes along with or immediately after the entry or at the bottom of the page. To save space, a separate column has not been used for the infrequent notations of deaf, dumb, blind, insane, or idiotic; instead these notations, where found, are inserted after a slash in the occupation column, i.e. /deaf.

Enumerators generally left the "Color" information field blank except when an individual was black (B) or mulatto (M). The blank field should apparently be taken to mean white (W).

Enumerators generally left the relation field blank for the "head of the family."

The following headings for information fields were preprinted on this census form—those here listed in *italic* typeface have been deleted from the following transcribed record for reasons of space (reading from left to right):

1. Dwellings numbered in the order of visitation; 2. *Of what material built*; 3. *Value*; 4. Families numbered in the order of their visitation; 5. Name of every person whose usual place of abode on the first day of June was in this



family; 6. Age; 7. Sex; 8. Color: White or black or mulatto; 9. Relation to the head of the family; 10. In what county of this State, or in what other State or Foreign Country born; 11. Married; 12. Widowed (re 11 & 12: these marital status fields we have combined into one field. This enumerator left the field blank when an individual was single); 13. Years resident in this city or town; 14. Profession, Trade, or Occupation; 15. Voters: Native; 16. Voters: Naturalized; 17. Alien; 18. Persons of color not taxed; 19. Persons over 21 years who cannot read and write; 20. Owners of land; 21. Deaf, Dumb, Blind, Insane, or Idiotic

## TOWN OF HAVERSTRAW, 2ND ELECTION DISTRICT

The Census taker for Haverstraw, 2nd Election District, was George Smith, and the enumeration began on 16 June 1855 and finished on 18 July 1855. The first two pages are bound out of order, so that the lowest numbered dwellings and families are actually on page 2; then page 1; and from that point on the pagination seems correct.

This transcript has been made using both Xeroxed copies of actual pages (thanks to Les Baisley), and microfilmed pages. The microfilm is sometimes dark and difficult to read. Mr. Smith had some handwriting peculiarities, including a final "s" that is formed like a modern capital "S." There are often other difficulties encountered while reading his handwriting. In some cases doubtful readings are a result of overwritten, or corrected, entries. Many of the dwelling numbers have been overwritten.

In addition to the family data transcribed here, there are several pages of agricultural data, including a listing of names of farmers and such information about their farms as acreage, harvest data, product information, value of farm, stock, tools, etc.
