✓ **Old Burying Grounds in Harriman & Bear Mountain State Parks** — Marjorie Smeltzer Stevenot has published another book of interest to local historians, Old Burying Grounds Within Harriman and Bear Mountain State Parks. Thirty cemeteries used by inhabitants of the mountainous region of Orange and Rockland Counties in New York (now Harriman and Bear Mountain State Parks) are described in this book, intended as a guide for hikers, historians, and genealogists. It includes maps and inscriptions from more than eight cemeteries (including full inventories of the following cemeteries: St. Johns-in-the-Wilderness (Episcopal) and St. Mary's on-the-Hill (Roman Catholic). The paperbound 6 x 9 105-page book is available for \$10.95 plus \$1.50 postage and handling, from the author, 150 Johnstontown Rd., Sloatsburg, NY 10974.

✓ **Rockland County History Book**
Reprinted — Now and Then and Long Ago in Rockland County, by Cornelia F. Bedell, first published in 1941, has recently been republished in its fourth edition by the Historical Society of

Rockland County. The book is a collection of chronicles of people and events, facts and legends.

Cornelia F. Bedell, whose family roots went back to Dutch settlers who colonized the county in the late 1600s, lived in Nyack all her life, and served as president of the Board of Education there.

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cover the entire state (except New York City, and Albany, Buffalo, and Yonkers prior to 1914). The indexes now available span the years 1880/81-1943 for marriages and deaths, and 1881-1918 for births. The indexes are transferred to the Archives after 75 years for births, and after 50 years for marriages and deaths.

The Department of Health vital records indexes contain summary data on millions of vital events in the Empire State, and are an invaluable tool for genealogical research. The indexes refer to the full birth, marriage and death certificates, which are retained by the Department of Health. Original registers of births, marriages, and deaths are in custody of the local registrars of vital statistics. The indexes between the 1880's and the 1920's sometimes lack data that may be found in the records maintained by local registrars.

Researchers may request the New York State Archives to search one vital records index (birth, marriage, or death) for one name for up to three specific years. The request must be made on a Vital Records Index Search Request form. Copies of the request form are available from the New York State Archives, Cultural Education Center 11D40, Albany, NY 12230 (phone 518-474-8955). Each request must be accompanied by a check or money order for \$5.00 (U.S. funds). Applicants requesting a search of the birth or marriage indexes must sign a statement

that the individual named in the request is now deceased.

The State Archives' response to a search request will indicate date, place, and Department of Health certificate number for each event found in the index. Multiple events for the name searched will be indicated on the response, as will finding of no events. (There will be no refunds for unsuccessful searches.)

The State Archives holds no original birth, marriage, and death records. Abstracts of birth, marriage and death certificates for genealogical research are available, for a fee, from the local registrar of vital statistics; or from the New York State Department of Health (for events outside New York City) or the New York City Municipal Archives (for events in New York City).

The microfiche indexes are available for public use Monday through Friday 9-5 in the State Archives research room, located in the Cultural Education Center (11th floor) in downtown Albany. For further information, contact the New York State Archives at 518-474-8955.

✓ **Slovak Databases** — According to an item in the Summer 1990 issue of the *FGS Forum*, The Genealogical Commission of the Slovak World Congress has created the Slovak Genealogy Research Center. Ray Plutko, Director, has a database of names, Slovakian regions, and villages. He also has developed the Slovak Genealogy Kit. You can send for this by writing to him at 16455 E. Prentice Place, Aurora, CO 80015.

Another Slovak database was taken from the worldwide directory of more than 80,000 members of the Association of St. Vojtech (patron saint of county training schools), which was published in 1930. It contains placename and surname indexes and is available from the Family History Library on roll #1183643, item 1. Or you may request a search by sending a SASE to the indexer, Andrew G. ✓ **Holocaust Records** — The National Archives and the American Red Cross have undertaken a project to microfilm documents pertaining to the Holocaust and to make them available to survivors and relatives of more than 300,000 Holocaust victims. These records will be housed at the International Tracing Service in Arolsen, Germany. Call your local Red Cross Chapters for a request form to search the records. No charge, but can take a year or more. (From Fall 1992 *FGS Forum*)

Conrad is the son of Hendrick Bos. Conrad & Elizabeth Bush's daughter, Catharine (bapt. 1778 Tappan Irregular Ch., d. 1819) married c. 1794/5 Daniel Youmans. D. Youmans (b. c. 1767/8, d. 1851) was of New Hempstead, Orange Co., NY per 1796 deed. Where can background of Hendrick Bos, his wife and family; Elizabeth Cramer &/or Daniel Youmans be located? County.

There is the usual beginning of State of New Jersey, County of Morris, Township of Washington, Court of Common Pleas, etc. ... Abraham Lefoy sought a pension for his services having entered the military on 15 August 1780 at Tappan, (now) Rockland Co., New York under the command of Capt. Jacob Blauvelt.

He distinctly recalled the capture of Major Andre, the British spy, and of seeing him executed at Tappan in Oct. 1780, near the post of his command. He recalled that a short time before Gen. Cornwallis took a party of the enemy, surprised and destroyed an entire troop of cavalry at the village of Old Tappan, killed and wounded all but 16 men, whom they took prisoners to New York, leaving Col. Baylor and Major Clough mortally wounded. Both died of their wounds. Major Clough died at the house of the deponent's mother in Tappan and Col. Baylor died at a neighbor's house nearby.

The deponent sayth he was born in New York City, 17 Dec. 1764. All their family records were destroyed by robbery and depredation of his mother's house during the Revolution.

Of all the material I have read of this time frame in American history, I do not recall ever reading the names of the families who took in the wounded officers. Who was the neighbor? Who was the deponent's mother? Obviously she was Mrs. Lefoy or was widowed and remarried.

If you have any information concerning these two families, I would greatly appreciate hearing from you.

Beginning Genealogy

Program presented by Ellen McGuire at the January 26, 1993 meeting of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County

Notes by Joan Brooks, Recording Secretary, GSRC

Ellen McGuire teaches a beginning genealogy course in the adult education program at North Rockland High School.

The first thing one should do when beginning the search for ancestors is to start with what you know, and then prove it, using documents, by talking to family members and relatives. Once this is done, you move back one step. Once documents, such as birth, death, and marriage certificates, etc., have been obtained, they can be passed on at a later date to other generations.

As you are obtaining this information, you should be setting up charts (family group sheets, pedigree charts, etc.). A family group sheet should be completed on each family, even if you do not know all the children; you can fill in the gaps later on. Eventually, you will be able to make a separate folder on each family name.

Organization is very important — being organized will save you double work.

1. You should use one of the accepted numbering systems to keep track of your ancestors.

2. Keep a research calendar — tracking all the sources you have already used for a family name. This will avoid your doing it twice if time passes before you get to it again.

3. Everton publishes many pamphlets on doing research in the U.S. and other countries. These are usually listed in *The Genealogical Helper*.

Vital Records: You can obtain information on where to send for vital records (birth, death, marriage) from the U.S. Government Printing Office. The booklet breaks down each state by county and town, telling you where the records are (it could be different for each state).

Reference Materials: The Rockland Room at the New City Library is an excellent source for reference materials. You can use the bimonthly publication, *The Genealogical Helper*, which contains all kinds of genealogical information. *The Handy Book*, published by Everton Publishers, lists the county seats of all states in the United States, as well as the years for which records are available.

It is important to go back to the place where your family started. Write to the local library, historical or genealogical society, etc., in the area. A genealogy may already have been done on your family name. You can write to these places, but you may not

always get an answer. However, it is worth taking the chance. Hiring a professional researcher should be a last resort — it's much better to do it yourself.

When you write to anyone, always include a stamped, self-addressed envelope (SASE) as a courtesy; you will be more likely to receive a response. You should also offer to pay for postage, copying, etc. If there is no charge, you can send a donation if you wish.

Most information in record depositories will be indexed, which makes it easier to research. You will most likely have to go to these places and research the records yourself, and you might still meet some resistance. Basically, you are entitled to look at the records.

Cemetery and church records are sometimes wonderful — sometimes not. The staff in the offices are sometimes cooperative — sometimes not.

The staff in the branches of the Mormon libraries are extremely cooperative — locally there are branches (stakes) at Emerson and Mahwah, New Jersey; and New Windsor, New York. You can request microfilm from them. They also have the International Genealogical Index (IGI); this is also at the New City Library.

The National Archives branch is no longer at Bayonne, NJ, but at Varick Street, New York City. There is a parking lot nearby and a cafeteria in the building. The one drawback is that there are very few microfilm readers. You should plan on spending the entire day there, rather than a few hours, since you may have to wait for a machine. This branch office has military records, immigration, census, and naturalization records.

When you visit the National Archives, you should have a definite plan in mind, so time isn't wasted. Usually, Ellen takes her adult education class at least once to the Archives. A few times she has been lucky to reserve a special day just for themselves. It's well worth the trip! ■

Methodist Church Records

The original name of the denomination was Methodist Episcopal. In 1939, with the union of the northern and southern church, the official name became the Methodist Church. The union with the United Brethren in 1968 changed the name again to the United Methodist Church.

New Jersey Conference — The archives at Madison, NJ do not contain records of individual churches such as baptismal records. They may include ministers who served the church and biographies of those ministers. Visitors are welcome to do their own research at the library. Call 201-822-2878 or 2826 for hours and location. Contact Hilda A. Parks, Researcher.

New York Conference — The only records of baptisms and marriages are of the Newburgh Circuit (1789-1835). Most do not say where the event took

place. To research the archives, make an appointment with Shirley B. Porter, archivist, 32 Maple Dr., Mahopac, NY (phone 914-628-3441). She is usually available once a week, Tues. or Weds.

Hempstead

(1) **Hempstead**. An early English settlement (founded 1643) in Queens County, NY.

(2) **Hempstead**. A locality in Rockland County, N.Y. Originally established as New Hempstead on March 18, 1791, and named from the fact that many of its settlers had come from Hempstead, Queens County, N.Y. Its name was changed in 1798 to Hempstead and the name was again changed (to eliminate confusion with the other Hempstead on Long Island) to Ramapo April 17, 1829.
