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of foreign-born ancestors, can be a good source of genealogical information. Applications from Oct 1795 through March 1925 are at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), and those from April 1925 to the present are in the custody of the U.S. Dept. of State. There are four major types of passports: regular, emergency, special, and insular. Applications for regular passports generally include the applicant's name, date and place of birth, and physical description. Some give the applicant's occupation, foreign destination, and reason for travel. For naturalized citizens, the applications may state the court and date of naturalization as well as the date and ship on which the applicant immigrated to the U.S. Photographs have been required with applications since 21 Dec 1914. Indexes and chronological registers for some years can be found on National Archives Microfilm Publication M1371. Request copies of passport records from 1795 to 1905 from: General Reference Branch (NNRG), National Archives and Records Administration, Washington, DC 10408.

Reading Old Tombstones

To help to decipher and/or photograph the lettering on a hard-to-read old tombstone, try this:

(1) clean the stone with a brush with natural or nylon bristles (don't use a wire brush), using some vinegar in the water to help remove lichen.

(2) use a can of shaving cream and spray a small amount into the lettering.

(3) with a ruler or straight-edge, spread the shaving cream, then remove the excess.

The lettering may now be much easier to read.

ANSWERS TO QUERIES

❖To Query No. 30 (December 1993 issue), re CONKLIN, ECKERSON, two replies from Mrs. M. Smeltzer-Stevenot, 150 Johnstontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974:

ABRAHAM CONKLIN, Jr. was b. 8 May 1784, bp. 27 June Paramus RD, NJ. He m. Wyntie Mabie 10 Nov 1808 Tappan RD.

Abraham was the son of William Conklin (b. 1751, d. 1825) and Elizabeth Hunt (b. 1751, d. 1837). In 1797 they moved to Franklin Township (now Mahwah Twp.), Bergen County, NJ. Both are buried in the RD cemetery in Mahwah. Abraham Jr.'s grandfather was Abraham.

Did Abraham Jr. live in NJ after his marriage? If so have you tried baptisms in Island Church, Mahwah or Paramus RD for possible children?

The MABIE COMPENDIUM may have Wyntie (there's a copy in the New City Library). She may be listed also as "Lavinia."

ECKERSON. Have you checked the Ackerson/Eckerson published genealogy? If Annatje (Hannah) is not there, contact their archivist, Mr. Ethel Kolenut, c/o Bergen County Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 432, Midland Park, NJ 07432.

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In the 1870 Orangetown Census, John Conklin, 48 (ca. 1822), a carpenter, had a wife Adeline 35 (ca. 1835) born New Jersey.

They had children Emma, Catherine, Hannah 12 (ca. 1858) and Smith. Living with them was Maria Clark, 68. She may be Adeline's mother.

In 1850, Abraham Conklin 68, a mason of Orangetown (ca 1782) and wife Lavinia 54 (ca 1796) had sons Johnathan, 25, a carpenter, and Abraham 13. This looks like your line. Abraham's census age is only two years off his baptismal age. "Lavinia" is the equivalent of "Wyntie."

It looks as if you have the right Abraham and Wyntie after all. I have this Abraham back to Deliverance (grandson of John & Helena of Eastchester) who settled in the Tappan area.

Naurauschaun

An area within the Kakiat Patent in Bergen County, N.J. and east of Pearl River, in Rockland County, New York. In Rockland County, also called Sickeltown and Van Houten's Mills. Also the name of a stream in the area. The name is that of an Indian tribe of the region.

Negro Pond

Also called Nigger Pond and Van Duser's Pond. Earlier known by the Indians as Pothat or Potake. A small lake near Sloatsburg, in Rockland County, N.Y. A survey of the area made in 1774 mentions "...negro Guy's improvement..." and tradition has it that an early landowner, Mr. Rutherford, allowed black settlers to make their homes here.

New Antrim

Early name for Suffern, Rockland County, N.Y. Its name was derived from the birthplace of its early settler, John Suffern, who had been born in Antrim, Ireland.

John Suffern (with his brother, whose family later settled in S. C.) arrived in Philadelphia 6 Aug 1763 and worked his way northward. He taught school in Tappan and later settled at New Antrim (Suffern), where he ran a store which became a landmark during the Revolution. He was a member of the Assembly from Orange County in 1781 and 1782. He was also the first Judge in Rockland County in 1798. He was a State Senator from 1800 to 1803. He owned about 2,000 acres of land in Rockland Co.

New City

Established as the county seat of Rockland County, N.Y. in 1774.

New Hempstead

A locality in Rockland County, N.Y., near Hempstead.

Early name for the Clarkstown, Rockland County, N.Y. area. The locality was also known as "Upper Pascack." It was named from the fact that a majority of its settlers had come from Hempstead, Queens County, N.Y. New Hempstead was organized from area taken from Haverstraw in 1791; in 1797 the name was changed to Hempstead; and finally changed to Ramapo in 1829. The first Presbyterian church in the county was established here before 1754.

Nigger Pond

A small lake near Slootsburg, in Rockland County, N.Y. Also called Negro Pond and Van Duser's Pond. Earlier known by the Indians as Pothat or Potake. A survey of the area made in 1774 mentions "...negro Guy's improvement..." and tradition has it that an early landowner, Mr. Rutherford, allowed black settlers to make their homes here.

Nyack

A community on the Hudson River in Rockland County, N.Y. Also Central Nyack, South Nyack, Upper Nyack and West Nyack.

Nyack Turnpike

A locality in Rockland County, N.Y. Also called Mount Moor and Clarksville.

Orange County

Chronologically, the fifth original county in New York State, organized November 1, 1683. Its county seat is Goshen, N.Y. Orange County was subdivided once, on February 23, 1798, the eastern portion (or "south of the mountain") becoming Rockland County, N.Y., with a county

seat at New City, N.Y.

Orangeburg

A locality in Rockland County, N.Y.

Orangetown

An early name for Tappan, and the county seat of Orange County at the time of the Revolution. Today a community (separate from Tappan) in Rockland County, N.Y. 1970 population: 53,533.

Orangeville

A locality in Rockland County, N.Y.

Palisades

Palisades is a locality or hamlet in southeastern Rockland County, N.Y., just north of Rockleigh, N.J. This Rockland County location was earlier known as "Rockland." The locality of Sneden's Landing (also spelled without the apostrophe: Snedens Landing) is on the Hudson here.

Pearl River

A community in Rockland County, N.Y., just north of Bergen County, once known as Middletown. It takes its name from the name of the stream here, which was named from the fact that at one time [probably during the late 1850s] many pearls were found in fresh water mussels taken from its waters. Earlier the stream was called the Pascack Brook.
