(2) William Johnson, b. 1767; d. 1842; son of James Johnson & Deborah -?- (Debra). James Johnson (Johnstone, Johnston, Johnson) was b. on Scotland and was employed by a ship building firm in England. He settled in New York, then he and his wife left New York and settled in the mountains now known as Harriman State Park in Rockland County. James's two brothers, Gysbert and Erastus, came here later and settled in the same hamlet called Johnstontown. This hamlet was named after the Johnson brothers about 1750. William Johnson (1767-1842) m. Abigail Dusenberry (1769-1852).

Notes of Past Programs at Meeting of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County

The Genealogist's Video Research Guide

Presented in three parts at the September 26, October 24, and November 28 meetings.

PART ONE

Sources:

Family Bible (check copyright date, handwriting); Biographies; Church Records; Civil Records; Marriage Records; Death Records; Obituaries; Memorial Cards;

Diaries and Journals; Legal Papers — Deeds, etc.; Letters; School Records; Fraternal Records; Newspaper Clippings (Birth, marriage, death announcements, awards); Scrapbooks, Albums; Occupational Records

Searching Records at the LDS Family History Centers

IGI: (International Genealogical Index) on computer CD-ROM discs and also on microfiche. Check the geographic area (Country/Province; State/County). Names will be in alphabetical order by surname. Christening, marriage and death records may be shown.

Ancestral File: A major resource. On CD-ROM by surname. When you find an ancestor, check the Family Group Sheet, Pedigree Chart, and Descendancy Chart. When you find your ancestors, check the source of the information for the microfilm number of the submitter. Look at the submitter information.

Family Histories: Check the Source File for histories (a secondary source which is only as good as the person who writes it.)

County Histories: Check the library catalog for county histories generally available from about 1800; some include bibliographies and biographies of people. Look at all members of the family and all books — each one may have added information. Check the military lists, and the tax lists.

Record Keeping: Pedigree Chart; Family Group Sheet (separate one for each marriage); Resource Record (keep track of all records researched and what you found or did not find).

Maps: Country/Province; State/County. Sometimes you need to check a radius of at least ten miles to locate the ancestor. Small detail map of specific area and a Plat map of County.

Read: all histories of area of research to understand how your ancestors lived.

PART TWO

Census records available 1790-1920 on the tenth year. There are indices for some years. There was a fire in the archives in 1890, census records burned. 1790-1830 show only head of household and numbers of males and females in age categories. In 1850 every member of a household was recorded as well as age, sex, place of birth, occupation, country of birth, naturalization. If no one was at home when enumerator called; and if he did not return to the house, the family would not be listed. If a child was away from home, he or she would be recorded with the family they were with at that time period.

There is a Soundex index on 3x5 cards on microfilm prepared by the WPA for some census years. First name is alphabetical; and the last name by first initial and numerical consonants in surname.

There is an Accelerated Indexing System from 1607 to 1906 — check for surname. This will help locate an ancestor when you are not sure where he was living at a particular time.

There are State or Territorial census records taken every ten years on the fifth year period (between Federal Censuses). These are located in large libraries and archives.

Probate Records: Includes Wills, Letters of Administration (if no executor had been named), Bonds, Inventory of Household or business and auction information.

Check Index to Wills. Probate records may include: Court Proceeding papers, Inventory of Estate (clues to occupation, status), List of Debtors, Auction (important for names of purchasers — many times family members).

Land Records: Deeds (clues to family names).

Tax Records: Property and Personal.

Record information for every person of your ancestor's name found in your search — a process of elimination.

At the Family History Center: Locality Search — State, County; then Probate Record.

Library Catalog: Check abstracts of Wills, Index of Wills, Letters of Administration. Surrogate Court, Probate Records. Send for microfilm.

PART THREE

Land Records. In America most people owned land, while in Europe only about 5% of the people owned land. Land in America was granted by the King to get settlers to go to the new land; owners also hired indentured servants to work their land and within a certain number of years the indentured were freemen.

After the Revolutionary War, many veterans were given grants of bounty land in lieu of payment or in addition to payment for their services. Records are in the National Archives.

After the states had given out bounty lands, the Federal Government took over the rest of the land for sale. Between 1800-1820 land sold for \$2 an acre. From 1820-1870, \$1.25 an acre. A man who wanted to buy land could go to the Land Office, claim the land he wanted, and pay the fee. At this time many squatters had claimed land. Once the Land Office came into being, the pre-emptor law ruled that anyone who could prove they had lived on the land a certain length of time and had first rights of purchase for that land.

The government also gave land to anyone who would plant trees on that land, and after a certain number of years, the land belonged to the planter.

Search the land records (in a courthouse or county clerk's office). Thomas Jefferson came up with a rectangular survey which is still in use today. This is a physical description of the location of the land.

The Homestead Act provided homestead land would be given but you had to live on that land. It was necessary to bring in an affidavit stating how many years you had lived on the land — usually neighbors would certify for each other that the statements were true; a notice had to be put in the newspaper that you were homesteading on the frontier; the land had to be posted. Many foreign-born who wanted homestead land were unable to read English and did not understand all the governmental requirements for this process. They would plead for their land and in most cases it was granted. Many papers were involved in

these requirements.

These papers are maintained in the National Archives. If you have an ancestor who received Homestead Land, you need a physical rectangular survey from the county involved in order to send a request to the National Archives for copies of all the homestead papers. It was the U.S. Government that gave the land away, but the recording of the transaction took place in the county courthouse.

Through a combination of census and land records you can locate genealogical information otherwise not available. Check the alphabetical listed of grantors (sellers) and Grantees (purchasers). (Alphabetical by category.) The deeds often name members of a family, including spouses (primary evidence).

A man had to have his wife's permission to sell property; her name would be on the document. Bits of information in each record in the file can add up to valuable genealogical facts.

Make a diagram of the property, including the names of all the neighbors. It may lead to unexpected information. Land records are not the easiest source but they are one of the best.

At the Family History Center: Check the Library catalog for the locality; check the alphabetical list of land owners, then check the indexes of grantors and grantees. This will give you the microfilm number to order. When you receive the microfilm index, check for the deed; this will give you the volume and page number of your ancestor's land. Then order that microfilm to see the actual record.

Military Records

During the Revolutionary War there was no draft. Men between the ages of 12-75 usually signed up. If you have a male ancestor during that time period, they would have served. There are records for the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, 1846 Mexican War, 1861-64 Civil War, 1898 Spanish American War, and the Indian Wars up to 1896. There are many military records in the National Archives and its branches.

Civil War Pension File: Civil War — the soldiers were farmers and there were many desertions during the planting seasons. Even though they had deserted (maybe more than once) they were honorably discharged. File includes questionnaire of the veteran — family information, marriage record, a record of where the man lived from time of discharge up to the time he applied for the pension. If the widow made the application you will find her own family information. There may be a surgeon's certificate with a record of the man's medical background.

The Military Record gives a physical description of the man, age, place of enlistment, and the muster rollcalls — giving place names where he saw action.

There may be Bounty Land Warrants.

Indexes are available (on microfilm) for all the wars at the National Archives, some libraries, and Family History Centers. There are registration cards for the Indian Wars. These indexes will give you the National Archives Number of the man and the war/wars in which he served. Use one form for each record such as: one for Pension, one for Military, and one for Bounty Land Warrant.) Ask for all

records in the file. To order forms write:

General Reference Branch (NNRG-P), National Archives and Records Administration, 7th and Pennsylvania Avenue NW, Washington, DC 20408.

For WW I and WW II write to: National Personnel Records Center (Military Records), NARA, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132.

WW I — registration for the draft June 1917 for men aged 21-31; next ages 21-45, and later, ages 18-20. There are 24 million registration cards in the National Archives and Family History Library in Utah. Information includes state/county a man lived in, birth place, date, address, occupation, work address and nationality. Check for additional names as there may be a card for a widow or brothers that contain other information.

The Family History Centers have indexes by surname for Vietnam and Korean Wars.

Vital Records

Include church and government records. Church records include christening, marriages or banns, and burials. In Europe you may only find christening dates and there may be several children in the family christened on the same date.

Marriage License or banns — Banns were read by the minister three weeks in a row, then the couple were free to marry if no one came forward with a reason why they should not be wed. You may only get the dates of the banns and not the marriage date.

Burial records — usually the next day after the death. In cold countries, burial date may not be until spring or summer when the ground had thawed. Be aware of this.

Government records — (In Europe civil registrations). See a pamphlet, "Where to Write for Vital Records" for U.S. and foreign countries. Newest books include telephone numbers.

Records to check: license application (names, birth date & place, names of parents). In 1800s there were no birth certificates. You can use a death certificate for proof of birth (secondary evidence). The death information would be primary evidence and the rest of the information secondary evidence as it is only as good as the informant's knowledge.

After a death record is received giving place of death and burial place, write to the cemetery for the burial records. Check the records for all brothers and sisters; they may contain additional information.

The Family History Center has vital records on microfilm. Order the film for the state and county, and check for your ancestor. Sometimes the FHC has copies of the vital records (applications, affidavits, licenses and/or certificates).

Family names are perpetuated in naming patterns. The eldest two boys and the eldest two girls were named after their four grandparents. First child named for a paternal grandparent; (first child, if a boy, for the wife's first husband (if any); alternate names, one child's name from the father's side of the family, next child's name from the mother's side; giving the name of a child that died to the next child born of the appropriate sex. ■

ANCESTOR TABLES

In order to increase interaction between members, the Society has begun to publish Ancestor Tables, which are a brief listing of the ancestry of members. These tables will be printed in expanded editions of the newsletter for a year, after which the Board will evaluate the response and decide whether to continue publishing these tables. It is hoped that members will find distant cousins who share common lines, which will further the research efforts of both.

Other members are encouraged to submit their Ancestor Tables to Bob Protzmann, 4 Ethel Drive, New City, NY 10956, who will assist the editor in their preparation for publication.

Please note: the Genealogical Society of Rockland County and its editor are not responsible for the accuracy of the Ancestor Tables.

We remind our contributors that they should be submitting only documented ancestors. Please do not submit names that are not well documented. If there is any uncertainty, then the listing should be preceded by a "?".

Anyone interested in a particular ancestor or ancestral line should contact the submitter for details and documentation.

Anyone who has contradictory data or corrections should send a note to the Newsletter editor, or to Bob Protzmann at the address above, as well as directly to the submitter.

The numbering system used is as follows: The submitter is number 1. The father's number is twice the number of the son or daughter; i.e. double that of the child. Each wife's number is one higher than that of her husband. Even numbers are always male ancestors; odd numbers always female ancestors (except for #1 which is the number assigned to the subject of the table). If all ancestors were known, then all numbers would be used; where ancestors are not known, those numbers are omitted.

If you have brief comments, corrections, or additions to a published ancestor table, or wish to note additional sources, published articles, etc., send them (referencing the Ancestor Table name, date of issue in which published, and the individual person's number in that Ancestor Table) to Bob Protzmann at the address above. We will publish these in a continuing dialogue, in the ANCESTOR TABLE FORUM.

SUGGESTIONS FOR FORMATTING SUBMISSIONS OF ANCESTOR TABLES

All submissions of ancestor tables are welcome in whatever format; we will, as time permits, retype them to fit our format.

If, however, you are putting your ancestor table together especially for us, here are some thoughts that might be helpful. Ancestor tables are presentations of genealogical data in a linear, text-oriented, non-graphic format. Think of them as fan charts or family tree charts stripped of their graphic format; just the text, or words, remain, presented in a linear fashion.

The following suggestions have been formulated in the interest of clarity and to prevent misunderstood information.

A **sample entry** might look like this:

A **more complicated entry** might look like this:

Begin the entry with the name of the individual, with the surname in all capital letters. For surnames such as DeBaun or dePew which are found, depending on individual family preference, written in a variety of ways (DeBaun, deBaun, Debaun, and DePew, Depew, etc.) indicate the correct spelling by writing the name in both upper and lower case letters (for instance, DeBAUN, deBAUN, DEBAUN). Any other surnames listed in the entry (for instance, additional spouses not in one's direct line) should not be capitalized. Only the mother and/or father in line in the ancestry should have capitalized surnames.

Use a comma after the first listing of the individual's name. Use semicolons between events, except after the final event in the sequence, when a period should be used. When the final entry lists the marriage to the next listed individual, the marriage event data should be followed by a comma.

Our preferred format for dates is day, month, year, with a space between them. Abbreviate months by using the first three letters. When indicating the place where an event took place, use the format shown in the above examples, with no comma after date.

Notice the format used in the more detailed sample (above) when there are multiple marriages for either or both the husband and wife. If there is biographical data about an individual, place the marriage in a separate sentence at the end of the entry, so that the husband's entry flows right into the next listed individual, when that next listed individual is, indeed, his wife. A careful reading of examples #22 and #23 above will tell you that the line contains the husband's second of two marriages, and the wife's second of three marriages.

All of this sounds complicated, but following these suggestions will, it is hoped, avoid misunderstood information.

Any other suggestions? We welcome any ideas that will add to the clarity of presenting genealogical data in the format of ancestry tables.
