THOSE BABCOCK BOYS

An essay about some of the early Babcock men who settled in Rockland County, with a special emphasis on Thomas Babcock, reputed to have been a scout for General "Mad" Anthony Wayne.

Over the years many have searched long and hard for clues about the origin of the Babcock families here in Rockland County. No one man has generated more interest than "Old Tom," Thomas Babcock, father of Isaac Babcock Sr., and progenitor of so many of those mountain families of Babcocks. Recently, several new pieces of information have been uncovered concerning Thomas. While not exactly primary source material, they will certainly help researchers in their quest for this elusive man.

For those not fully up to date on the Babcock family research, let me first provide a little background. As early as 1719 there were members of the Babcock family here in Rockland. This is evident when we study the Muster Rolls of New York Provincial Troops for 1759, [French and Indian War] found in the *New York Historical Society Collections for 1891*. Three men of interest can be found there: William Babcock, age 40, [thus born c/1719], born in Kakiat, James Babcock, age 28, [thus born c/1731] of Haverstraw, and Samuel Babcock, age 24, [thus born c/1735] born in Tappan.

While these names show an early presence in Rockland County, they fail to appear in subsequent years. Perhaps they were among the casualties of that war, or found other areas more to their liking. For what ever the reason, they do not reappear again in any record of this county.

In *New York in the American Revolution; by Berthold Fernow*, is a list of New York Troops, with the names of James Babcock, Job Babcock, Job E. Babcock, and Thomas Babcock, all privates, members of Hay's Regiment of Orange County Militia. Of these four, Thomas and Job will be dealt with in this sketch. The identity of Job E. Babcock is unknown; he may have been the son of Job Babcock. James was the brother of Job. (More about Job shortly)

In the first census of the United States, taken in 1790, ten men appear for Haverstraw: Elisha Babcock 2nd, Elisha Babcock 1st, Job Babcock, Benjamin Babcock, Elisha Babcock 4th, Thomas Babcock, David Babcock, Isaac Babcock, Joseph Babcock, and Job Babcock 2nd. The Census of 1800 lists only eight men, dropping two of the Elisha's, Job 2nd and Benjamin, but adding George Babcock and William Babcock. The 1810

Census has all eight from 1800, but includes an additional William Babcock and two John Babcocks. I'll leave an in-depth analysis of these census returns for a later date, and deal now with Job Babcock.

On September 25, 1987, Dorothy James Babcock Filor Decker typed the following account from the records of her father, Hiram Edward Babcock.

"The following information about the Babcock family was given to my father, Hiram E. Babcock, by Job and Easter Babcock on August 21, 1894, in their home on Division Street, Village of Haverstraw, NY.

"Job Babcock, the grandfather of the above named Job Babcock, came from the west and settled in Orange County. Later, after a division, it was called Rockland County. As near as could be known, Job Babcock settled here about 1754 in what is known as the Town of Stony Point.

"During the battle fought by General Wayne at Stony Point, his residence [Job Babcock's] was just to the southeast of that battlefield. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and acted as a guide to Gen. Wayne, showing him the approaches to Stony Point. His brother James was a member of the same regiment.

"After the war, he [Job] and his wife Polly followed the farming business. They both died while living with their son John, who lived in a house owned by "Major" Suffern. This residence was about a half mile west of the Rockland Print Works in the Town of Haverstraw. It was on the north side of the road leading to Theills Corner. Job died in 1832 and was buried in the Town of Stony Point at the age of 85. Polly died in the year 1833 and was buried with him. The place in which they were buried is known as the Waldron Burial Ground. It is located in Stony Point. The road leading to it is a dirt road, right off Main Street, just before going over the railroad tracks. The cemetery is now in bad repair and none of the tombstones are legible. They left a family of six children. They were named James, Benjamin, David, Polley, Sarah and John.

"John Babcock was born in the Town of Stony Point near what is now the Tompkins Cove line, in the year 1777. He was a soldier in the war with Mexico [?] in the year 1812-1814. He drew a pension from the government for his services and received a land grant for his service. He later sold this farm to Isaac Sherwood, the father of George and William. In the year 1805 John married Rachel Holstead, who was born in what is now known as Jones Point. They had a family of six girls and one son as follows:

Betsey - married James Perry ?

Hannah - married Isaac Babcock ?

Polley - married John Stout

Nancy - married Samuel Wood, brother of Ester

Sally - married James Waldron

Clara - married William Hill

Charlotte - married Samuel VanJult ?

Job - married Ester Wood.

{Math doesn't seem to have been Dorothy's strong suit. I count seven girls. Ed:}

"John died in 1853 in his home near the Samsondale Iron Hill. He was buried in Mount Repose Cemetery. Rachel died in the year 1863. She had lived with her daughter Clara Hill after her husbands death.

"Job Babcock was born on October 13, 1809, the son of John and Rachel, in a house up from the Cedar Pond Road which was called Bulsontown. He worked for Henry Christie, bringing lumber, logs, etc., from the mountains. He worked at the Christie saw mill in the mountains until his parents moved. Job died on May 3, 1900, at his residence in Division Street, Haverstraw, NY, at the age of 90. The Rev. W. Howard (?) of the Methodist Church of Haverstraw officiated.

"Job married Easter Wood, daughter of Joseph Wood, at her home in Ladentown on January 1, 1829. Easter was born on April 1, 1810. Easter died on Oct. 6, 1898, at the age of 88. She was buried in Mount Repose Cemetery on October 9, 1898.

"While married they moved quite often. They lived at one time in a house they built on the Jonas Wood property in the mountains; then to a Henry Christie house just north of the road that leads to Thiells; then to a Major Suffern house. This house was near Mead's Corner. Then to a Purdy house on Pratt St. Then they built the homestead, standing on the north side of Pratt Street in the year 1849. The house was built by a carpenter named Joseph Quick. In the spring of 1857 they moved up to the Penny Bridge in one of Wesley J. Wieant's buildings on the hill for the summer. In 1869 they moved to Division Street in Haverstraw."

As stated in the above transcript, Job Babcock was born circa 1747, parents and place of birth unknown, and came here to Rockland County in 1754. Since he was only seven years old, he was probably in the company of his parents or family. His family tradition has it that he came here from the west. That might indicate that the family was first in Orange County, or perhaps northern New Jersey. Since a great many of the Babcock's originated in Westerly, Rhode Island, and migrated in a westerly direction from there, I think this may have become twisted with the passage of time. Has perhaps "from Westerly" been changed to "from the west?" When we find the parents of Job and his brother James the answer will hopefully be apparent.

Roger King of the Orange County Genealogical Society wrote me that while working on the Elizabeth Horton Collection in the society library, he had found several notations about Thomas Babcock. Elizabeth Horton was born about 1890, lived in Orange Co., and apparently had a lifelong interest in both history and genealogy. After her death in 1986 her collected life's work in these fields found its way into the files of the Orange County Genealogical Society library, where Roger King had ultimately located the references to old Tom Babcock. While the two items are both undated and undocumented, [as are most of the Elizabeth Horton collection] and most certainly not what could be called "Primary Sources," they are none the less important finds, and shed new light on the Thomas Babcock mystery. The two items were found in April, 1998, and again in April of 2000.

In a small notebook is the following:

Babcock, Thomas

April 25, 1831 Thomas, son of Isaac, died at Swintown, oldest man in Mountains. 93 yrs. 4 mos. 3 days. led Wayne to Stony Point, buried Lewisboro cem., between two older graves.

J.W. Slawson

In another notebook:

The forgotten fact that Thomas, a revolutionary soldier was brought to light by the Antiquarian sometime in April 1916. Finding the grave of Wayne's scout at the old Babcock - Lewis yard and marking it on July 22, 1916, along with Silas Horton's grave, we are saddened Thomas only has a middle mound at the old homestead. [sic]

The two notes are reproduced here in different fonts to accent the probability that they were written by two different people. The first, written some 100 years or more after the fact, appears to be a man's cramped hand, and we can be sure the writer was not present when Tom died. The note also doesn't read like something from the recesses of memory, but sounds very much like what might be written in a family bible by a family member, someone proud of Thomas. The second was in all probability written by Elizabeth Horton. Roger King believes the "Antiquarian" referred to was the pen name used by a newspaper reporter in Orange County who wrote about historical subjects.

From these two notes we gain a great deal of new data. We now know that Thomas was born about 22

December, 1737, and was the son of Isaac Babcock. [Thomas had a son, Isaac Babcock, born 4 July, 1760], and that he died 25 April 1831. We also know he was buried at the Lewis Family burial ground, located on Seven Lakes Drive adjacent to the Silvermine Ski Area parking lot.

A third piece of new information about Thomas was found during the summer, 2000, at the Rockland County Archives. In connection with the Insolvency Petition of George Kile of Haverstraw, dated 31 December 1816, George Kile gave the following deposition:

"Real Estate - Lands and Tenements. I have none Either in possession, Reversion, Remainder or Expectancy Except the Rights to Bounty Land for the Services of Thomas Babcock, a private in Capt. Lee's Company in the Regiment of Col. Samuel Hawkins in the volunteer Service on the United States, conveyed to me by his brother, Abraham Babcock, his heir at law, by Grant Dated the 12th day of February, 1814."

"Monies Due- I have no monies due to me- Books, Vouchers and Securities I have none except the Assignment of Transfer of the Right of Thomas Babcock to Bounty land above described assigned to me by Abraham Babcock."

From this petition we learn that Thomas Babcock had a brother Abraham, to whom he had assigned his rights to Bounty Lands due for his service in the Revolutionary War, and that said brother Abraham was still alive in February, 1814. We also learn that in addition to his service in the Orange County Militia, Thomas had some service in the Volunteer Army. This is the first hint of regular service, and may account for Thomas's reputed connection with General Wayne as a scout.

POT CHEESE HOLLOW

[Ed: Pot Cheese Hollow was an area of Rockland County better know today as the Village of Spring Valley]

Pot Cheese Hollow: a name that serves as a reminder of the rural way of life that has nearly vanished from Rockland County. Many families in the community kept cows for milk and cheese as well as a way to earn extra money.

The earliest settlers in Spring Valley were farmers, tradesmen, and peddlers. The United States was the "Land of opportunity," and from New York City Spring Valley was only a train ride away. New arrivals to Spring Valley found an abundance of fresh air, but also a place to live, work and worship.

Spring Valley became one of Rockland's favorite shopping spots. Business was centered on Main Street, between the Erie Railroad Depot and Maple Avenue.

Some of the family owned shops on Main Street were Lefkowitz's Butcher Shop, Hellman's Butcher Shop, Garber's Live Chicken Market, Fradin's Grocery, Joseph's Fish Store, Pauline Brown's Ice Cream Parlor, Levy's Plaza

Restaurant, Mellion's Butcher-Grocery Shop, and Olitzky's Barber Shop.

Spring Valley became a resort that rivaled the Catskills. Some of the well known hotels were Spring Valley Gardens, the Fairview, Singer's, Auerbach's, Bader's, Bauman's, Rosner's, and Gartner's Inn.

Bungalow colonies were also popular, many springing up along the banks of streams and rivers, Lake Suzanne in Monsey and Hyenga Lake in Spring Valley. After summer retreats in the area fell out of favor, bungalows underwent different reincarnations. Some, like Bader's in Spring Valley, became senior residences. A few made the transition to summer day camps, and others, like Hyenga Lake, became low rent housing. When the Tappan Zee Bridge opened in 1955, increasing the postwar exodus to the suburbs, many bungalow colonies were replaced by modern housing developments.

Prior to 1850, the educational systems in Rockland County were geared to an agricultural way of life, and schools were largely one to three room facilities. There were several different kinds of school districts in Rockland: Common, union free, consolidated, and village superintendency.

Common school districts were limited to the first eight grades. There were 27 such school districts in the county. *[Authority within these districts was vested in a sole trustee, or a Board of trustees, a clerk, and a collector.]*

Union free districts differed from common school districts in that they could establish high school courses. There were 10 such schools in the county.

Consolidated school districts were formed by the union of several common school districts, or the union of several common and union free districts.

The village superintendency was an autonomous unit under the control of a board of education, which appointed the superintendent and reported directly to the State Education Department in Albany.

Between 1940 and 1970, the 47 tiny school districts scattered throughout Rockland County were combined, updated, expanded, and rebuilt from tiny one room grammar schools into today's modern centers of learning.

One of these consolidations was what was to become East Ramapo. On March 4, 1952, seven union free school districts in the Spring Valley area centralized and became known as Ramapo School District #2. On August 23, 1973, the name was changed to East Ramapo Central School District.

"Pot Cheese Hollow" was originally seen in "East Ramapo a Retrospective" published by East Ramapo Central School District in June, 2002, and is reprinted here with the permission of the author, a GSRC member.

Abraham & Magdalen (Powlison/Powles) Ferdon/Ferdone

Abraham Ferdon, Pvt., NJ Militia, Revolutionary War Pension No: W7254. Bergen Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 10 Nov 1841, Magdalen Ferdon, age 80, formerly Powleson/Powles, a resident of Harrington, Bergen Co., NJ., widow of Abraham Ferdon, who d. 19 Mar 1831, m. 20 Jun 1780, by Rev. Samuel Verbryck at the tavern of Christian Campbell, in Tappan, Rockland Co., NY (another source states they were m. at her father's, Martin Powelson, house in Tappan).

Others mention in pension: Leah Westervelt, age 78, as of 28 Oct 1841, sister of Magdalen Ferdon, was bridesmaid at wedding. Mariah Blauvelt, age 82, as of 04 Nov 1841, was present at wedding, at that time I was married to Magdalen Ferdon's brother, Powles/Paul Powles/Powelson, I saw their father, Martin Paulison/Powles, on guard duty at Closter, Bergen Co., NJ during the war. I am the former widow of Powles/Paul Powles/Powelson, and presently married to John A. Blauvelt, I was raised in Closter, Bergen Co., NJ. Rev. Isaac D. Cole, of Orange, Rockland Co., NY. John A. Ferdon, age 56, Nicholas Ferdon, age 53, of Harrington (no relationship stated), both of Bergen Co., NJ as of 04 Nov 1841. Testifying as fellow soldiers in the Revolution on 04 Nov 1841. John A. Blauvelt, age 80, James J. Blauvelt, age 78, Daniel Van Sciver, age 88.

John F. and Jacomynty/Jamima (Blauvelt) Haring

John F. Haring, Sgt., NJ Militia, Revolutionary War Pension # W7662. Bergen Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 31 Oct 1832, John F. Haring, age 72, b. 15 Jun 1760 Harrington Twp., Bergen Co., NJ, resided at father's, Frederick, house when entered service in Jun 1776. British Refugees burned the house of Samuel Demarest at Closter, Bergen Co., NJ. I know the following men who can testify as to my war service, Harman Blauvelt, Cornelius Quackenbush, Garret F. Haring.

Bergen Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 17 Oct 1836, Jamima Haring, age 76, formerly Blauvelt, of Harrington Twp., b. 25 Nov 1760, widow of John F. Haring, who d. 10 Aug 1836, m. 02 Nov 1780.

Carpenter Kelly, Pvt., Corp., Sgt., NJ Militia and NY Continental Line, Revolutionary War Pension No. W877. Bergen Co., NJ Common Pleas Court, 03 Jun 1841, Hester Van Saun, formerly Brower, age 81, a resident of Hackensack, Bergen Co; NJ; widow of Cornelius Van Saun, who were m. in the fall of 1788, he d. 09 Aug 1832, I was also formally the widow of Carpenter Kelly, who d. Feb/Mar 1784, m. 01 Feb 1779 Tappan RDC. Carpenter Kelly was residing in New Bridge, Bergen Co., NJ; when he served with the Bergen Co. Militia. Served under Lt. Daniel Onderdonk in the NY line. In Mar 1777, Carpenter Kelly, Abraham Storms, Abraham Masscre/Matscor/Masker?, and John Vorhis were taken prisoner and held at the Sugar House prison in NYC; in Aug 1777, Carpenter Kelly escaped from prison and returned home to Clarkstown, Rockland Co., NY.

Only children of Carpenter Kelly and Hester Brower:

- 1) Rachael, b. 20 Oct 1779.
- 2) Sarah (Sally), b. 24 Oct 1781, as Sarah Everson, age 62, a resident of Hackensack, Bergen Co., NJ as of 04 Jun 1841. Both daughters present at marriage of their mother, Hester Brower Kelly, to Cornelius Van Saun.

Another record shows a John ____? b. 24 Dec 1796. Other names and dates illegible.
